Why Japanese?

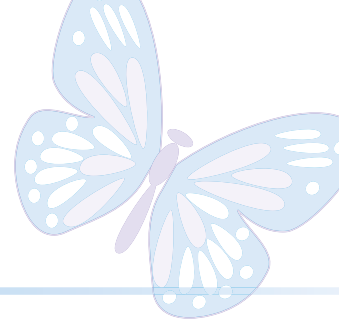
Learning Japanese can have both short and long term benefits through the introduction and acquisition of a new culture. In the short term, your children can look forward to unique activities relating to a new culture such as Japanese, which may be very different from their own. Fun and exciting classroom activities will motivate children to learn and embrace new ideas and concepts. In addition, children will develop improved learning skills in the areas of concentration, memorization and comprehension. The end result of a successful Japanese language education is a sense of self-confidence and pride, acquired by the learner, which they may not have had before.

Longer term, children will acquire important values through the study of Japanese. These can include persistence and respect for other cultures, important values in Japanese culture. Acquiring fluency in foreign languages, especially ones that are very different from English, allows children to understand their first language on a deeper level because they are better able to analyze it more critically. Learning one foreign language often has the unintended benefit of snowballing into the acquisition of a third or fourth language within a child's lifetime.

Potential lifelong opportunities are the most important long term benefits of learning Japanese. Children who learn to speak Japanese will have the advantage, when visiting Japan, of being able to interact with local cultures in ways that the typical tourist cannot. Japanese language facility will also enhance their ability to engage in multicultural friendships and exchanges. In the global community we now live in, having the ability to speak a second language such as Japanese can open many doors to educational and employment opportunities. More importantly, it shows potential employers that your child is an intelligent, respectful and globally-conscious individual.
